Choose to refuse single-use plastic



In 2021 about 140 million people from 190 countries took part in Plastic Free July, choosing to refuse single-use plastic in their daily lives. This reduced global plastic consumption by 300,000 tonnes.

By taking the Plastic Free July challenge you are reducing plastic waste going to landfill and potentially ending up as a pollutant in our environment.

Simple actions can make a difference at your home, workplace and school.

Here are 5 ways you could start Plastic Free July:

- Keep it simple, bring your own KeepCup when getting takeaway coffee.
- Choose reusable straws for sipping cool drinks.
- Look for unwrapped items to purchase, without plastic packaging, wraps or films.

The National Reconciliation Week 2022 theme, 'Be Brave. Make Change.' is a challenge to 'individuals, families, communities, organisations and government—to Be Brave and tackle the unfinished business of reconciliation so we can Make Change for the benefit of all Australians.

During Reconciliation Week, members of Moonee Valley's Early Years department will attend two Yarning Circles at Strathmore Heights Kindergarten with Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Elders. Educators will have the opportunity to learn more about respectful relationships, cultural protocols and building better connections with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and their families.

Moonee Valley Councillors and Council's Executive members will continue their ongoing Aboriginal Cultural Awareness and Insights training further to further explore the challenges faced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and provide feedback on presentations delivered by attendees.

Registering your pet helps us reunite lost pets and their owners and to monitor animal welfare. That's why Council requires all pets in the municipality to be registered.

Annual pet registration fees help support Council's animal management services, including:

- Providing off leash dog parks
- Monitoring for illegal animal breeders
- Collecting stray and loose animals
- Education and promoting responsible pet ownership

Registration fees also go towards maintaining the Victorian Declared Dog Register.





Pop Up Bicycle Lanes



New pop-up bike lanes for Mount Alexander Road and connecting streets. Map: Roads Victoria

Moonee Valley is now home to over 23km of pop-up bicycle lanes in a bid to make it safer and easier for cyclists to move around Moonee Ponds, Essendon and Travancore.

The COVID-19 pandemic has changed how people are moving around Melbourne, with many people turning to cycling as a main mode of transport. It is Moonee Valley's priority to support Active Travel and provide safe transport options for cyclists new and old.

The pop-up bicycle lanes will connect existing off-road paths on the Moonee Ponds Creek Trail to a mix of local and arterial roads. The main feature is 3km of separated lanes on Mount Alexander Road, which will provide a main connector to the CBD and other centres in Moonee Valley.

With these pop-up lanes in action, you can enjoy the health benefits of cycling to work or school while still feeling safe. Take your bike for a spin on these

new and improved connections today.

Want to get rid of your waste?

Need to dispose of large items or prunings? Properties that pay the annual Waste Service charge are eligible for two free collections per financial year for either hard waste or garden waste. Properties with a private bin collection are not eligible for the free service but can purchase an at-call collection.

You can leave out up to 2 cubic metres $(2m \times 1m \times 1m)$ of hard waste for collection. Place it either in your front yard or on your driveway, no more than 10 metres from the property's front boundary. Please don't place hard waste on the nature strip if there's one outside your house.

Join the fixing revolution

Got something broken that you're thinking of replacing? Do you really need something new, or can your old items be fixed?

Enter the fixing revolution. From mending clothes to repairing bikes, fixers are back and they are popping up everywhere. By reducing consumption and challenging our 'throw away' culture, fixing is a great option to help you reduce, reuse and recycle.

We don't all have the skills or the tools to fix the things we need, but we probably leave close to someone who does. That's where the free Fixable app comes in. A new social enterprise that has recently started in Moonee Valley, Fixable connects people who can fix things, with those who need something fixed.

Participants can get things fixed, register their fixing skills, and also buy, sell or give away parts, components or other items that may be junk for one person, but useful to someone else.

Sue and Jim from Keilor East are both recently retired and have signed up as fixers. Asked why they joined, Sue said "Fixable's mission struck a chord with me. Not only do I love to extend the life of items and prevent waste, I have struggled to find people to mend or repair things for me."

Sue has been mending clothes and fabric for 40 years, and wants to share her skills with people who are keen to improve their sewing abilities. Jim has restored a 1974 VW Kombi from scratch and is a living, breathing "Mr Fix-It". He's one of those people who can help with everything from furniture repairs, to home handyman tasks, and anything mechanical. Jim sees Fixable as a way to help and connect with more people in the community.

Fixable is looking both for professionals and skilled hobbyists who want to help their community and earn some pocket money in the process.

Protecting Heritage in Moonee Valley

Council helps protect heritage places by conducting thorough studies, consulting with the community and working with the State Government. Based on this work, we make recommendations to the Minister for Planning about what to include in the Heritage Overlay, and changes to places on the Heritage Overlay.

Local heritage places, as well as some State heritage sites are listed in the Heritage Overlay of the Moonee Valley planning scheme.

The planning scheme also sets out the purpose and scope of the Heritage Overlay, as well as the locations of protected heritage places.

As of today, 6,413 properties are listed and protected by the Moonee Valley Heritage Overlay.

We are currently working on the 2022 Heritage Study which will investigate post-war and late post-war places and precincts, trees and parks, and community nominations for heritage protection. Stay tuned for further updates including maps, timeframes, and opportunities for public consultation.

Backyard Bird Count

Each year our community help scientists better understand of the lives of birds across Australia by taking part in the Aussie Backyard Bird Count. In 2021 our wonderful local bird counters recorded 14,219 observations across Moonee Valley.

Thanks to everyone who took part. The data will be used to help us evaluate part of Council's Green Action Plan. Observers recorded 79 species in the area with the Rainbow Lorikeet the most-sighted. Observers found that four of our rarest native species are raptors and three of these live in lakes and wetlands. To help wetland birds threatened by habitat degradation Council has restoring wetlands to help put back these important habitats. These wetlands harvest storm water, which irrigates our sports fields while providing a sanctuary for wildlife.



urban areas with remnant bushland. Tree hollows are an important home for many birds. As it can take up to a century for natural tree hollows to develop, Council maintains 'stag trees' pruned back to a trunk so they can still form hollows and provide nesting sites for years to come.

The Aussie Backyard Bird Count runs for one week every October. Anyone can take part - it takes just 20 minutes of observing in your backyard, street or local park. If you can't wait until October you can visit **birdata.birdlife.org.au** today to start your own survey.
